# The Crabs really shined in 2001-2002!

It was just one year ago that I was elected your District Governor, and wow, what a difference a year makes! The district board looked to the stars, setting 5 lofty goals for the district this year, but you, the members were up to the challenge!

Over 21,000 service hours were performed so far this year (as of DCON), and there is no doubt in my mind that 24,000 will be surpassed by April 1! Currently, there are 806 members in the Capital District, putting us only 10 members shy of the largest district in CKI!

More than half of the Capital clubs applied for district awards- that is awesome! 6 members were inducted into the Society of Distinguished Collegians (several criterion, including 3.0 GPA and 250 hours of service) and 2 received the Service Recognition Award (250 or more service hours from January 1 to December 31, 2001). No one had received either of these honors during the past 2 years!

Service was at the core of the district as you can tell by the service hour total, with a meaningful project at FTR and service fair at DCON. In all their spare time, clubs even made connections with their Kiwanis family counterparts, at meetings, Sponsored Youth nights, and projects, to name a few.

# Melanoma Awareness: Sun Rays, Cancer Slays

Did you know that just one bad sunburn at the age of 20 can trigger malignant melanoma that might not show up until age 50? That gives you 30 years to forgot about something that could possibly ruin your life, or maybe even end it. We all know the dangers of Cancer: Smoking and Lung Cancer, Lumps and Breast Cancer, Tumors and Brain Cancer. But is the world today truly knowledgeable about Skin Cancer? Does the average person know that a 20 minute tan that gives a week long glow could also permanently age the skin?

While Malignant Melanoma is perhaps the deadliest of all cancers, the scary part is that it's also the most preventable. There are tons of products available that can protect the skin while it is exposed to the sun. Sunscreens of SPF 15 are essential. S,P, and F aren't the only letters you should remember when thinking of protecting yourself from cancer. Also keep in mind A, B, C, and D. You might find it childish and very Sesame Streetish to use letters like this, but when you save yourself from chemo therapy, lymph nodes surgery, and other painful situations, you might just send Big Bird a letter of thanks.

The ABCD's of Melanoma refer to Asymmetrical, Border, Color, and Diameter. When the skin is exposed to the sun, cells can mutate and form cancer. The ABCD's are ways to check for signs of this mutation. Search your skin for moles. If there is a mole that is asymmetrical, has a rough border, multicolored, or has a diameter of larger than 6 millimeters, please visit a dermatologist to have it checked for cancer. Those four letters can save your life, the life of your mother, the life of your friend, the life of your third cousin...

Awareness is the key to stopping Melanoma. We need your help to spread this simple knowledge. Call your local dermatologist for further information, and perhaps he or she can donate materials to your Circle K Club that you can use to hand out around your school or community.

Just as the commercials for "The Truth" advertise, knowledge is contagious. We just need to spread it around. Do your part. Save a life, it might just be yours.

At the next traffic light turn left onto College Ave. Proceed through the next traffic light, and at the last possible driveway on the right, take a right. The General Store Restaurant is opposite this driveway. If you reach the traffic light for US1, you have gone too far. The driveway has brick columns on either side and leads you to Goolrick Gymnasium. Park anywhere on the left in the gravel lot.

### To walk to Lee Hall:

From Goolrick Gym, walk along the red brick path straight through the middle of campus. Follow the walk up a hill and past a large fountain. Lee Hall, adorned with many countries' flags is on the left.

# The GWUCK Effect

For a club that had an active membership of eight members last January, it is hard to imagine how to measure "success". Although the 2001-2002 GWUCK Executive Board has certainly been instrumental in ensuring the success of our Circle K club, all we did was lay a solid foundation. The now over fifty-five active members of The George Washington University Circle K have created a snowball effect that gained momentum in September and keeps tumbling to this day.

There are three main factors I believe have contributed to the success of our Circle K. Last year as Vice President, I quickly realized that weekly member meetings deterred members from actively participating in the club's activities. Upon installation, the first policy enacted by the Executive Board was the implementation of monthly meetings. With monthly meetings, PR and recruitment became less stressful and less problematic.

Second, monthly meeting were accompanied with themes like "Get Fresh", "Get Leid", and "Circle K: The Alternative". Members began attending meetings in record numbers to partake in icebreakers and games. Discussions of upcoming service projects were limited to the first 10-15 minutes of the meeting; the bulk of the meeting focused on the fellowship activities for members to interact and make friends. Dues-paid members were also able to cash in on member benefits like a Circle K mug or raffled bookstore gift certificates.

Finally, no matter at what cost, our Circle K was present at each freshman orientation, collecting names for our email listserv and spreading the word about GWUCK. After seven orientations, our club recruited three hundred potential members. While only a fraction of those three hundred paid dues and joined our club, those members have become our most service-oriented and ambitious members.

While formulas for success are not exact, I urge club officers to set the stage for progressive changes that boost membership and produce as our Executive Board calls it: The GWUCK Effect!
