Dues Process Explained

As membership recruitment starts gearing up for the year, you may find yourself wondering about how the dues paid membership works this year. Well, life has gotten a little easier and you now send all dues (both district and int'l) to international. But how much are dues? Dues are \$25 per member with a breakdown of \$18 for int'l and \$7 for district.

NOTE: It has come to my attention that all forms that were received by the clubs state that the dues for district are \$7.50, but this is not the case. They are still \$7. There is another error, which is the date that dues are due. See the "important dates" below for the correct information.

For those clubs that are able to achieve 20 members by Nov. 1, even if you are still getting membership dues, make sure to send in your membership list to be eligible for the Early Bird Dues award. And when you get your 20 members, don't stop there! Go for thirty, then forty, then your entire school! Let everyone know Circle K is the best organization of its kind out there.

Nov. 1 – Early Bird dues deadline*
Nov. 30 – Dues are due on this date*


the K-Family for 4 years, holding various offices in Key Club at the club, district, and international levels
